

Trisha-Lee, a psychology major at Brock and a Dean's Honour Roll student three years running, is applying to graduate programs in psychosocial oncology. Her goal? "I want to advance the understanding of how young people can prosper and shine during such a difficult time. And after, too."

Trisha-Lee has been speaking as a survivor advocate for eight (8!) years. She is particularly committed to the Rankin Cancer Run, which raises funds in the Niagara region. She considers her personal battle as her biggest accomplishment and source of inspiration. She plans to dedicate her career to helping individuals emerge from their experiences with cancer in the very best way possible.





Justine is taking her Masters in Communication at Carleton – while serving as a Teaching Assistant and working on a graduate diploma!

Justine is dedicated to young adult activism. One cause particularly close to Justine's heart is the annual Terry Fox Walk, Run and Wheel. In addition to participating, she has spoken for the cause.

Justine has also blogged for cancerfightclub.com, which provides support and resources to the young adult cancer community. She volunteered at a local high school's music department while undergoing

treatment; she has also served as a vice-president of Carleton's Graduate Students' Association. and, through Phi Sigma Sigma, supported causes such as the CIBC Run for the Cure.

Malcolm, a biology student at Mount Allison, went to the Canadian Cancer Society's (CCS) Camp Good Time as a child and loved it so much that he volunteered until he became a counselor. He also volunteers as a speaker at CCS events, in both French and English.

Malcolm is very active in Relay for Life events in his home province of New Brunswick – shaving off his blond mane in 2013 to support the cause. He has now been asked to participate in the CCS national



fundraising campaign. He also volunteers at the local YMCA to help youths with special needs.
